From the President: Dr. Pellett talks Downtown Revitalization

It is widely known that Glenville State College is critically important to the higher education opportunity and cultural, social, and athletic enrichment of Central West Virginia. However, GSC is even more critically important to the economic vitality of Glenville and Gilmer County. In terms of economic impact, the West Virginia University Bureau of Business and Economic Research reported in 2016 that GSC's annual economic impact in the local economy was almost \$28 million. Also, almost 300 Glenville State employees and 1,700 students further contribute about \$1 million back in state and local taxes. When considering that this is all accomplished with only about \$5.6 million in state appropriation, GSC could easily be considered a phenomenal return on investment for the State of West Virginia at large.

In the interest of positively impacting the local economy further, Glenville State College is embarking on an ambitious one-million-dollar economic stimulus investment in downtown Glenville. This investment will center around two substantive and significant initiatives that will further bridge downtown Glenville with the college campus. The first initiative will be the refurbishing and remodeling of the Conrad Motel into a modern and attractive residence hall. Besides providing employment for several workers in Glenville this summer, the renovation will create a new residence hall that will house up to 90 new students this fall, creating the potential for economic opportunity and an unprecedented demand for food and other services downtown. We hope that current restaurants and stores will see increased sales and traffic as could new ones. There will be no better time to start a business or restaurant in Glenville than this fall.

We will be making this move throughout the summer and will work in the fall to improve signage, activity, and overall building appearance.
